Guildford Mens 1s 5 – 2 Havant (Marsh 14, Boot 19, Wood 30, Haynes 47, Rippon 62)

After an extremely positive pre-season that included games against Cambridge, Richmond, Oxted, Teddington, Old Loughtonians and two sides in Antwerp the new look Guildford squad 2012/13 was eager to get the season underway. This year Guildford boasts a young squad pushing 20 in size which means that competition for places will be fierce and our strength in depth will make us the envy of some other teams in our league.

As you can see from the scorers, this result was a team effort that required spirit and endeavor from everyone throughout the squad. Wessex Masters League Cup, Pool C Guildford Pilgrims 3 - 1 Chichester Priory Park Deacons

I always forget how a long hockey season catches the very end of the summer, freezes its knackers off during winter, then suffers once again in the April sunshine. Last Saturday was no exception, with our opening game being played on a hot afternoon at Broadwater. Thankfully a burgeoning interest in the Pilgrims squad over the summer meant that our first match was supported by a squad of 15, allowing us plenty of, er, 'rest breaks'.

Not so much luck for the opposition who spent the 48 hours prior to push-back playing a cat-andmouse game of 'got no umpire, got an umpire, got no umpire'. In the end they turned up with 10 players plus one, and only the last minute intervention of our very own Geoff Tonks on the whistle allowed them to field a full side. (As an aside, it always surprises me how teams that for whatever reason, don't provide an umpire still feel entitled to complain and pass comment on the decision making. I mean, come on!) So a few early niggles from them plus our own nerves at the first match of the season made for a slightly awkward game.

Our opening goal was provided with newcomer/returning player Rich Crombie, all 17 foot 19 inches of him, pouncing on a nice delivery from Mark Howells to slot the ball in the net. Chichester had very little by way of response, relying on old-school hockey stylee of a sizeable sweeper smashing the ball down the pitch in the hope that it would arrive on the end of a friendly stick. On the few occasions when it did, they were able to string together a pass or two and make a little progress towards our D. Generally, though, their attacks were quickly snuffed out by our solid defence, now including the fresh faces of Richard Woods and Russell Alexander, as well as a healthy-looking & fully-convalesced John Asdell.

However, one good break from them was enough to deliver an equalising goal mid-way through the first half. Our reply wasn't long in coming. James Shelbourne, taking inspiration from the Olympic hockey, attempted a short-corner flick into the top right corner of the goal. The resultant dribbler into the bottom left counted as a goal all the same.

Gordon Wyllie extended the lead with his trademark move - a classic poach from no more than 6 inches from the goal line – and we arrived at half time with 3 goals to their 1.

The second half was pretty disappointing. I'll put it down to the heat, early season lack of fitness, and a general malaise that we weren't winning more comfortably. None of the attackers could find the net despite some very impressive linking play from defence through to midfield. James Shelbourne collected a bad knock to his hand (which we now think might be a fractured thumb), and Mike Kefford was on the receiving end of some pretty rough tackling.

Still, we clung on for the win, which starts us at the top of our pool for the League Cup.

Whitchurch 1 – 4 Guildford (Mullon 15, Marsh 20, Blockley 35 + 52)

The last time Guildford Hockey Club enjoyed such a successful start to the season Shakespeare in Love had sealed Best Picture at the Academy Awards, England had plummeted to the bottom of the Wisden Test Match Rankings, and The Backstreet Boys were top of the UK singles chart with 'I Want It That Way'. 13 years and 465788 shuttles later, Guildford have yet again won their first two matches of the national league season.

This Sunday saw Guildford earn a comfortable 4-1 victory at Whitchurch in a fixture that had all the hallmarks of a classic 'away-day' in the amateur sport: 6am alarms, caramel-cream cappuccinos, 150-mile journeys, monsoon rainfall and three vital points.

The G-Strings, as the Guildford team have affectionately become known, started the stronger of the two sides providing regular probes into the Whitchurch defensive quarter. The away team deservedly opened the scoring when Craig Mullon latched onto a reverse-stick cross from Will Blockley to deflect the ball into the bottom corner. Whitchurch responded with a deep two-thirds press allowing the Guildford back four to rotate the ball with ease but preventing first phase passes into the midfield. However the G-strings soon broke down the Welsh side's press and began to slide balls into dangerous attacking positions. With 20 minutes on the clock, Duncan Marsh extended Guildford's lead with a wellexecuted 'back-of-the-hand' slower delivery serving to deceive an embarrassed goal-keeper.

Whitchurch reduced the cushion immediately after being awarded a penalty-flick, deposited with aplomb by Rupert Shipperley. The home side - cheered on by a crowd just as large and enthusiastic as one would expect for a County Championship match at the neighbouring Swalec Stadium - soon built up a steady wave of momentum and began to exploit any areas Guildford left exposed. However it was the Gs who responded next when Blockley roasted a drag-flick into the side-netting on the stroke of half-time.

Whitchurch reacted superbly after the interval and tore into Guildford's D, alerting Simon Mason for only the second occasion of the match. Mason was left helpless as a beautiful lob floated over his head, destined to dip under the bar and to bring the Welsh back into contention. However, captain Ali Falconer rushed back to produce a spectacular goal-line clearance of the finest quality.

Guildford soon took full control of the fixture as Whitchurch began to tire. The closing 20 minutes saw the Gstrings in full attacking stride, attacking effectively down both wide flanks. Blockley put the result beyond doubt with another drag-flick to continue Guildford's strong success rate at penalty corners. The victory launched Guildford to the outright top of the West Conference.

Guildford 3s 7 – 2 Kings Alleyn's 2s

Regime change can often be a tricky beast. So, with former captain Phil Harris moving up in the world at the end of last season to become men's section captain, new leadership was providing as much curiosity as how well a squad sporting 5 new players would gel in our first fixture of the season.
