Bourneville 1 – 5 Guildford (D Marsh 3, Haynes 2)

28 degrees in October? We travelled up to Birmingham to play Bourneville watching along the way with some trepidation as the mercury rose almost to 30 degrees! Despite these environmental factors and a couple of injuries to players, we were still confident that our squad fitness levels would see us through and be able to take the game to the home team.

After some team application of sun cream (double layers for Ali and Snowy), we started strongly and put the Bourneville defence under real pressure. This paid off immediately with the ball breaking to Duncan Marsh who flicked past the keeper after just 3 minutes. Our perfect start was negated 2 minutes later by a Bourneville goal.
