#### Bath Buccaneers 1 – 1 Guildford

#### (Rippon)

Guildford Men's 1<sup>st</sup> XI travelled down to Bath to take on top of the table Bath Buccaneers. Knowing this was going to be a tough game; and one which could decide the eventual league standings Guildford were hoping for a strong start to the game.

As expected the game started at a quick pace with possession being shared between the two teams. Turnovers and some good interceptions prevented either team from being able to build any solid attacks. A quick breakaway opened up an excellent early opportunity for William Blockley to put Guildford in to the lead. However, he was unable to capitalise on this with his reverse stick shot not troubling the keeper. As the first half progressed, Guildford continued to have the better of the chances. Matthew Wood rounded the keeper but was only able to find the side of the net, rather than the back. Another chance fell again to Blockley but the keeper was able to parry away his flicked shot. Towards the end of the half Bath Buccaneers took the lead when their forward rounded the keeper and bobbled the ball in to the net, past Simon Cox who was unable to stop it on the line. Half time Bath Buccaneers 1 – 0 Guildford.

The second half started in much the same way. Possession changed regularly with Guildford turning the ball over cheaply in midfield. Chances in front of goal were few and far between for Guildford with attacks consisting of just the forwards rather than build ups involving the midfield. Despite this Guildford managed to score the equaliser through Mike Rippon from a well taken short corner. From there on Bath had the greater possession and better scoring opportunities with Guildford's turnovers preventing them from securing a foothold in the game. Some excellent defending and goal keeping from the back 5 kept the scores level till the final whistle. Final score Bath Buccaneers 1, Guildford 1. A hard fought point from the table toppers at the start of the day!

Despite a rich vein of form in the opening games of the season, Guildford have stuttered coming into the Autumn with three 1-1 draws. The latest is by no means a disaster with a point away at Bath who have won the league on three previous occasions but more goals will be required and the game against **Cardiff University at home on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> November** will be crucial for Guildford to remain in the hunt.

Here is what England Hockey had to say about the other games in the Western Conference:

Cardiff UWIC moved to the top of Conference West with a surprisingly low goal difference of just plus one, five fewer than fifth placed Cheltenham. Their I-0 victory away at Cheltenham came via Ben Croxall's strike in the 19<sup>th</sup> minute and established a one point lead. Team Bath Buccaneers was held to a second draw in three games to drop from first to third, Ben Mackey scored in the 22<sup>nd</sup> minute for Team Bath but within six minutes Guildford pulled level through Mike Rippon and the scores remained I-I. University of Exeter moved into third thanks to an Ian Haley inspired 3-I triumph over Whitchurch. Haley scored twice as University of Exeter registered their fourth win of the season and second in a row. Havant's fine run of form continued with the side, at one stage bottom, having gone undefeated in their last four games including three victories. Their latest fixture involved a 3-0 win on Saturday over bottom side Bristol Firebrands with Satchin Reddy, Andrew Pett and Gurmukh Bhamra all hitting the mark. The final game in the division was an eight goal thriller that finished level between University of Birmingham and Fareham. Will Byas scored twice for University of Birmingham as the two sides in seventh and eighth fought out a hard earned draw, Fareham's third in five games.

#### Wimbledon 2 – 4 Guildford 2s
