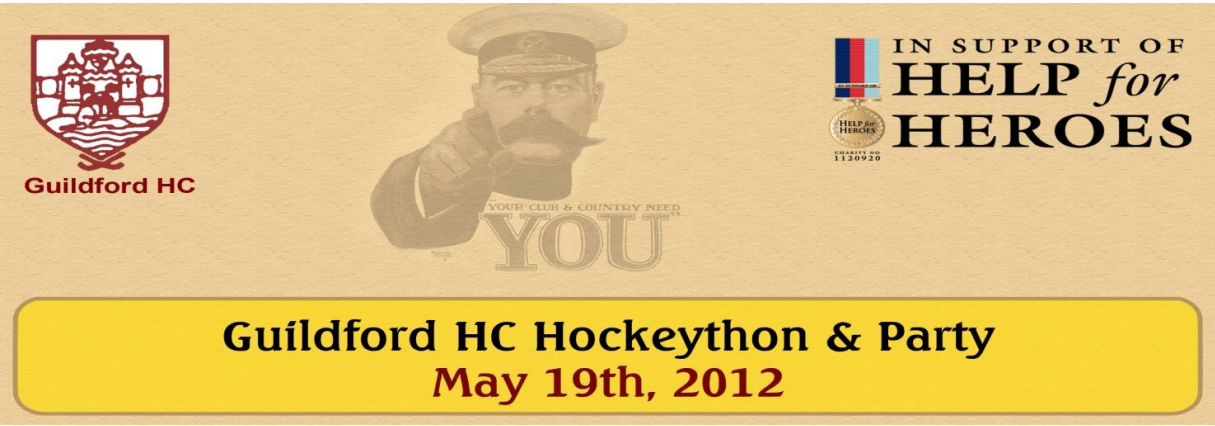

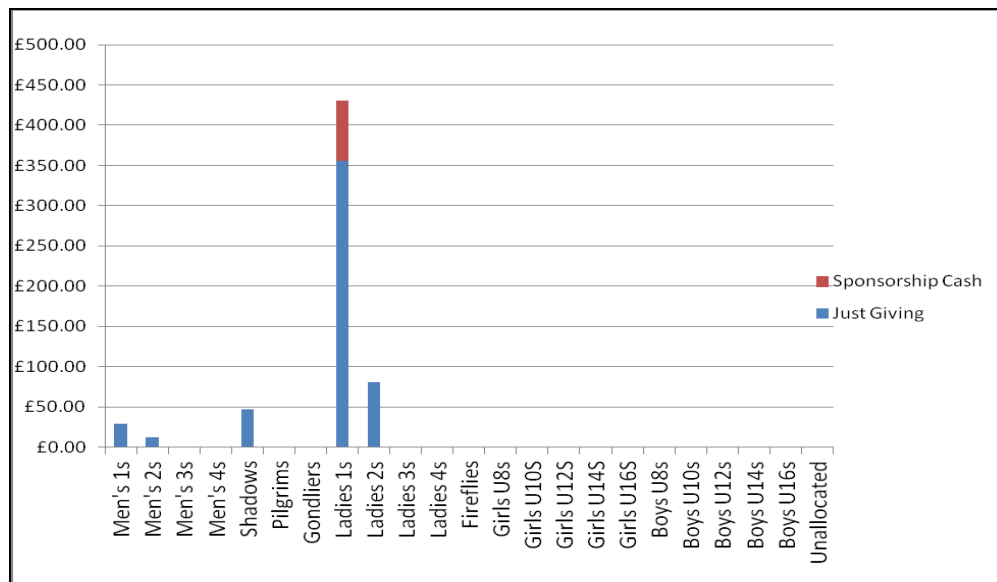

### **Guildford Shadows 3 - 2 Surrey Spartans 2's (Copeland, Farrant, Shrewsbury)**

The Derby

After a team email from the skipper on Friday letting his army know that the game may be getting called off with the white stuff looming on the weekend, it came as a surprise to us all that the Spartans pitch, located in the flash new Surrey sports park, was not frozen and we were good to go with the 1230 pb. Half of the mighty shadows did however spend the first 15 minutes of what could

After a brilliant victory over the Spartans last week, the Guildford Shadows where in high spirits for this game, also helped by the fact that it wasn't quite so cold and a nice 3:30pm pb. In fact the weather was so nice that, despite turning up to a game of actual sporting activity, some players got mistaken and managed to keep their sunglasses on for the entire warm up, and yet managed to avoid any fines/dod votes! After a decent warm up and knock around the game was good to go. Having been 6-0 up last meeting against their Sanderstead opponents at half time, only to win 6-4, the Shadows knew that this team could score goals. We started well, and spend the first ten minutes or so with the ball barely getting in to the Guildford half. Eventually this dominance lead to an opening goal, via the shiny new stick of Shadows forward Tom Copeland. With a brilliant bit of skill from Leon leading to a shorty, in stepped big Ross who calmly smashed the ball against the back board in trademark fashion. The top league side headed into the break 2-0 up.

Having remembered what happened last time, the Shadows realised that they could not afford to be complacent, and headed out with a 0-0 game mentality. Luckily, we had scored two, otherwise we would have been 1-0 down after five minutes of the second half! Sanderstead's attacks eventually

leading to a well taken goal that would in fact be the only real scare for the Guildford team. Remembering their skippers plea for 'more goals' at HT and the fact they could now go level, Guildford re started the game with the same passion and hunger that had has been integral to their winning ways this season, and had been missing from their past few outings. This in turn created more opportunities and an excellent attacking display from the Guildford team for the last 30 minutes of the game and can be neatly summed up in two words- Goal and Time! Shadows top scorer (of the defenders) Timmy Wright stepped up to the plate and neatly slotted away a well worked team goal to give the Shadows a 3-1 lead. Copeland was next to strike, a great move and pass through from top diamond Sam allowed him to sneak in behind the defenders on to the pass and one hand deflects the ball through the keeper's legs, 4-1.
