

MEN'S SECTION

Sunday 4th March

The race for second place hotted up as Guildford (3rd) travelled to Havant one place above. The weather true to form for a Havant away fixture was cold and miserable delaying our warm up.

It was a keenly contested opening ten minutes with Havant maybe shading it. This was to pay off one minute later with a stroke being awarded for what the umpire interpreted as a body in the line preventing the ball from going in. Saturday 3rd March

Guildford Mens 4s 1 - 3 Leatherhead 1s

The 4's took on Leatherhead knowing a win was needed to ease their relegation troubles. With a strong starting 11 the team played some great passing hockey and pulled apart a poor Leatherhead 1st team in the opening half. A flurry of short corners and good attacking play down the flanks saw numerous chances created. A mixture of poor finishing, wayward final balls and leatherhead scoring from their only shot on target saw the scores at half time level at 1-1. Confidence was high though, with the team knowing that if they played anywhere near as well as they did in the first half, or anywhere near their potential they should have run out comfortable winners. However, the half that followed was extremely disappointing, and Guildford struggled to replicate their initial form. It was a disjointed, unattractive, and weak half that allowed Leatherhead to score 2 more goals and run out comfortable 3-1 victors, all but guaranteeing their safety for next season. The 4's now have 3 games to avoid relegation and save a season which has promised a lot and, in the main, failed to deliver.

Haslemere Men's Vets 1 – 3 Guildford Pilgrims (Lenel, Howells, Morris)

That was a fantastic match from pretty much beginning to end. It was a delightful combination of excellent play by the Pilgrims against a challenging opposition, solid and confident umpiring, all played (on the whole) with a very good attitude throughout. And the sun was shining. And we won. And no-one got sent off*.

I couldn't believe my eyes when, for the first 10-15 minutes at least, Haslemere really struggled to get the ball from out of their own half. Man marking across the whole pitch, and Gordon Wylie with a fresh set of Duracells keeping their defensive line on their toes, meant it wasn't long before opportunities started to come our way. Lenel opened the scoring after about 10 minutes, closely followed by Howells deflecting a Morris blast into the circle.

The second half was marred by an epic combo; a perfect storm of unfortunate events. James Turner had been clashing sticks with the oppo all game, but this time it was their man in blue, with the ball, who suddenly raised his own stick to bat away James' advances. Mark Howells was less than impressed with the umpire's decision to call it against us and tonked the ball away in frustration. Deciding then to upgrade their free hit to a short corner, the umpire found himself at the receiving end of James Shelbourne's ire. I'm proud to say the team coped admirably in Shelbourne's absence. Our defence had no trouble mopping up Haslemere's occasional forays into our half. J-T, Toplas, Winn and Morris passed the ball beautifully across our territory and used many opportunities to press forwards. Adrian finally saw some goalmouth action in the second half but pulled off some beautiful saves. Howells, Rees, Turner and Basey filled in the space in midfield and continued to harass their attacks and distribute forward when we had the possession. A delightful opportunity arose from some nice passing from a breakaway Wylie to Lenel on the edge of the D, who squandered a one-on-one against the goalie with a really powerful air-shot.

Finally, however, still down at 10 men, we earned ourselves a short corner which Mark Morris drove into the backboard with consummate ease.

A fine win which to all intents and purposes puts paid to any lingering doubts about our ability to avoid relegation this season. Technically we could still be relegated, but it would involve Southampton (Played 19, Lost 13, Goal difference -48) beating Oxford Hawks (Played 18, Won 16, Goal Difference +113).
